






Presidents Report

Tom Rowlands was another who braved the cold putting in the hours and landing good sized fish. He was rewarded for his efforts when he won heaviest fish. On Sunday the weather forecast was for gale force winds so at around 4pm the committee called all members together in the chalet with the view of closing the competition early due to safety concerns. It was agreed by all that this was the best decision so we settled back around the heater had a few drinks and observed the weather from inside the chalet. Winter at Pedder 2015 with John Groves

On Sunday mid morning with the wind strength increasing grandson Lachlan and I managed to enter bells basin and find a quiet corner to shelter in and flick out the plastics but no fish were caught . We noticed the wind up on the ridge top getting worse and wondered if anyone on the lake was in trouble or caught down the lake. By early afternoon radio messages were heard over the VHF radio as the committee was trying to locate members to check on their location and determine whether they needed assistance getting to the ramp or shelter. We were receiving ok from our location but when trying to contact "Ridiculous" we were not heard so it goes to show that you may have to move to enable your transmission to be heard. We waited until a lull in the strong winds then proceeded to the mouth of Bells Basin to find the wind was howling down White-spur with water spouts and white water. A call was made to Matt and Gary giving our location and our intentions was given. I said to Lachlan this will test the boat out getting across here so when a lull appeared to happen in front of us, off we went the trim tabs worked a treat keeping the boat level and nose down. Apart from wind spray we had no problems getting across. We noted the radio transmissions of other boaters and stayed in Strathgordon bay waiting to assist if required.

Marine Radios in this situation are the best addition you can put in your boat and I advise all that don't have one to seriously consider the advantages of having one either portable or fixed.

It is fantastic that we have VHF radio facilities in our boats but do we know how to use them correctly? Listed below are a few things you may like to consider;

- 1. Can I use or do I know the correct terminology for marine operations?
- 2. What does the silence periods mean on channel 16? and when are they observed? also what does it mean?
- 3. What is channel 16 used for?
- 4. Can I receive and relay a mayday call?
- 5. If your boat runs out of petrol in the middle of the lake is this a mayday or pan-pan?
- 6. You find a large piece of wood floating in the lake what action do you take?
- 7. Do you know the phonetic alphabet can you pronounce or say the words correctly?

Which call procedure is correct?

Fishing lure retrieval approaches with Martin and Matthew



Martin and Matt decided to test some new 'fishing lure retrieval' approaches during their April trip to Lake Crescent. Martin sent in the following report on the event for our newsletter:

It was a pretty cold morning on Lake Crescent, but we were keen to get close to the shore and cast some lures underneath the overhanging gum trees, as we'd seen fish working that area some months before.

The inevitable happened pretty quickly - fortunately to Matt and not me! Matt managed to place his lure in a part of the gum tree that we couldn't reach from the boat! Yep, he'd done one of those famous "loop casts" which travel somewhere near the stratosphere, before returning to the lake and diving in to see if there are any fish around. His lure was well stuck, and unfortunately the line broke in attempts to pull the branch gently towards the boat to get the lure off.

Me, having some sort of blonde moment and deciding to show solidarity with Matt, then threw my (much cheaper) lure into the branch also, to see if we could drag it closer to the boat to get the first lure back....not to be. So now we've got two lures in the branch, nicely stuck. Oops.

We tried reaching the branch with the landing net, and even thought about standing on each other's shoulders, but decided to go for an easier option. So we untied the anchor rope, Matt located a reasonable sized rock, and next thing you know, Matt's throwing rocks at the tree.

In only discovered later, when looking at the photo, that it was clearly a deliberate attempt to throw away my line, as Matt has evidently let go of the both the rock and the end of the anchor rope! Lucky it didn't go too far, I suppose.

Three 'casts' later, Matt snagged the branch and between the two of us we gently eased the branch towards the boat. All was going great until there was a crunch, a snap, and we were both covered in gum leaves and twigs. Yep, the branch decided the only way it was going to let go of the lure was to join us in the boat. Fortunately the main part of the branch hit Matt in the head, ensuring limited possible damage to the boat or either of us - although to be fair the whack on his arm must have hurt, as it gave him a bruise nearly as big as the egg on his head (which I'm sure would have hurt if it had landed on my head, but Matt was only semi-conscious at the time, so he didn't complain too loudly!).

I managed to get the easier end of the branch (phew!) and, after picking our way through the gum leaves, we located the lure, tied back on the anchor rope, and found some nurofen to help fix Matt's headache. We also had some liquid pain reliever which worked even better than nurofen apparently, according to Matt?!

In a show of strength (and perhaps solid head?) Matt and I went on to catch a nice fish just off the tree, missed a couple of other takes, and kept fishing for the whole day. Impressive display of both stamina and ability to block pain, I reckon, from Matt.

Since then, I've put the extending boat hook pole back in my boat, just in case I start casting at koalas by accident, and need to get up close and personal with any gum tree branches in future! I've been thinking about also carrying a helmet, but perhaps that's going one step too far!

Tight lines everyone - have a great day, and watch out for falling branches. Martin Exel


